

5 Steps: When Your Employee Tests Positive for COVID-19 Guidance for New Hampshire Businesses

Employee health information shared with their employer should be kept private.

Identify and Exclude Employees Who Might Have COVID-19

Employees who test positive for COVID-19 or have symptoms of COVID-19 and were at their place of employment during their infectious period (starting two days prior to symptom onset or test date if a person doesn't develop symptoms) should notify their employer. Anybody with symptoms of COVID-19 should be tested.

Employers should have a designated person to whom employees report when they feel ill or have tested positive for COVID-19.

Employees who test positive for COVID-19 or have symptoms of COVID-19 should stay at home and <u>isolate</u> from other people. Employees should not return to work or other community settings until they meet criteria to stop home isolation.

Notify Potential Workplace Contacts & Recommend Symptom Monitoring, Masking, and Testing

Employers should have a plan in place for quickly notifying potential workplace contacts of employees with COVID-19 who worked while infectious (e.g., people working in shared office space).

Workplace contacts do not need quarantine but should self-observe for symptoms. Wearing a well-fitting face mask when around other people for 10 days after their last exposure and getting tested for COVID-19 on day 5 after an exposure (even if they do not have symptoms) is recommended. Anybody who develops symptoms should <u>isolate</u> and get tested.

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Review Your Prevention Measures and Seek Help If You Have an Outbreak

Implement Return to Work Policy

Employees with COVID-19 should not return to work until they meet criteria to stop home isolation.
